# **Veterans Day 2019**

On one of the last, mild days of autumn, hundreds of veterans, scouts, elected officials and citizens gathered at Greenlawn Memorial Park to celebrate Veterans Day with Post 1244.

Our newly elected commander, Donna Boyle, called the assembly to order and Post Chaplain Charlie Tritto presented the invocation.

Commander Boyle then led the assembly in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Harborfields High School Chorus performed the National Anthem and Commander Boyle gave a brief speech about veterans day from the point of view of all veterans. Veterans increasingly find themselves to be an ever smaller minority of the population of the United States.

1st Vice Commander Carlo Giordano delivered a great speech outlining the accomplishments of our Post and the service we continue to render to the community and nation. Our veterans are, indeed, still serving our country every day.

After Post 1244 presented our wreath at the monument

and our Auxiliary did the same, Commander Boyle invited other organizations in the community to present their wreaths. As usual, the most touching of these groups were the Boys Scouts and Girls Scouts, looking very serious at the prospect of this honor and rendering a salute after placing their wreaths at the base of the memorial.

When the final wreath was placed, Victoria Bell, a Harborfields High School student rendered "Taps" the lonely yet comforting sound heard at countless veteran funerals since the Civil War.

After concluding remarks by Commander Boyle, and a benediction by Chaplain Tritto, the Harborfields High School Chorus, joined by many in the crowd, sang God Bless America. Our ceremony was over.

Most of us then headed off to Applebees for our annual complimentary lunch served by the most delightful staff at the Commack restaurant.

# **Boys State and Girls State 2019**

Post 1244 is again beginning its work on the 2020 Boy's & Girl's State programs, both of which take place after the school year ends in late June 2020. This is our 12<sup>th</sup> year with Boy's State and 7<sup>th</sup> year with Girl's State. We are now working with the principals and guidance departments of four local high schools (Harborfields, Whitman, Huntington, and Commack), plus with students that directly approach us from other high schools.

We have begun to receive the lists of potential candidates from the various schools and will shortly begin the interview process so we can make the selections. As usual, this is the toughest time of the year for us – making the selections from what is inevitably a wonderful group of well qualified students.

Each year, more and more people become aware of this unique educational program and its value, which gives us the



opportunity to aim at continued growth. We would like to send as many of these students as possible to each year's program. This encourages us to continue working hard to assure we have the fiscal ability to fund the tuition.

With the very much appreciated help and support from our community, we will be able to maintain and continue growing these programs from our humble beginnings of two students from Harborfields in 2009 to beyond the 22 students from seven high schools we were able to send in 2019.

It is nice to know that in a short period of time these same students may be a part of the leadership of our nation, and we hope they will put what they learned at Boy's & Girl's State to good use.

# **The American Legion High School Oratorical Contest**

How knowledgeable are Americans about their government and the founding document that guarantees their liberty?

In 2019, the Annenberg Foundation found that only 2 in 5 Americans (39%) were able to name all three branches of government.

Most importantly, more than a third of those surveyed in 2017 (37 percent) cannot name <u>any</u> of the rights guaranteed by the First Amendment.

Since 1938, the American Legion High School Oratorical Contest has developed knowledge and appreciation for the U.S. Constitution among high school students. The program has presented participants with an academic speaking challenge that teaches important leadership qualities, the history of our nation's laws, the ability to think and speak clearly, and an understanding of the duties, responsibilities, rights and privileges of American citizenship

For many years, Greenlawn Post 1244 has sponsored local students in this contest.

Contestants compete in the county, district, zone and Department of NY levels, hoping to make the finals held each year at American Legion National Headquarters in Indianapolis.

This year, we sponsored three students from St. Pius V School in Melville. Students at St. Pius V are required to take a full year course on the United States Constitution.

Each year, they do exceptionally well in the contest.

In this year's contest, Leah Pohalski from St. Pius V placed first in the county contest and will be competing on January 11 at the 10th District contest against students from Nassau, Suffolk and Queens.

Last year, Leah won the County, District and Zone contests, going on to compete in the State finals in Albany.

We wish all of this year's contestants well!

Woods was a Texan. He was born in Houston and enlisted in the Navy there in 1954. He served honorably for the next 4 years until his discharge in 1958 at the rank of Signalman 2<sup>nd</sup> Class. We have no idea how he wound up in New York City, but we know he passed away there in February of this year. He was indigent and unclaimed. As a result, he was buried in a mass grave in Potter's Field on Hart Island. What no one realized at the time, was that he was, in fact, a Korean War Veteran and eligible for interment in a National Cemetery with military honors. Yes,

# A Matter of Honor: Interment of Needham Mayes

Needham Mayes was born on Valentine's Day, 1934 in New Bern, North Carolina. In 1953, he enlisted in the Army and was soon qualified as a parachutist and assigned to the 82<sup>nd</sup> Airborne Division, Fort Bragg, North Carolina. He served proudly, but in 1955, was involved in an incident of questionable circumstance, and given a dishonorable discharge. He relocated to New York City the following year.

The stigma of his discharge lasted many years and found him fighting many demons along the way. But in 1978 his life changed. That year he earned a bachelor's degree in Social Science from Adelphi University and later went on to earn a master's degree. He eventually became a licensed social worker and therapist, and for the rest of his life, gave of himself by working with community-based organizations, helping those that were facing their own demons.

Despite his years of helping others achieve their

dreams, he knew that his discharge prevented him from realizing one of his own; to one day be awarded the honorable discharge he needed to be buried along-side his fellow veterans in a national cemetery.

On 27 September 2019, after a long and emotional quest for justice, Needham was awarded the honorable discharge that had eluded him for more than six decades. I'd like to believe it was God's way of putting an exclamation point on the final sentence, of the final chapter, of Needham's journey for vindication. Veteran Mayes passed away on Veterans Day, 2019.

On December 2, 2019 he joined his fellow veterans in the hallowed ground of Calverton National Cemetery; his simple marble headstone providing a lasting tribute from a grateful nation. May he now and forever, "Rest In Peace."

# Flag Respect and Education

If it has to do with the American Flag, our Sgt. at Arms Charlie Armstrong is our "go to" guy.

Charlie, along with Rick Tierney, is the driving force behind our flag collection efforts with all 11 of our Town of Huntington Libraries as drop off points for unserviceable flags. Our flag deposit box is placed in the lobby of each library for one month during the year. South Huntington Public Library hosts our deposit box for two months.

In addition, all Huntington libraries will accept unserviceable flags at their front desks at anytime and will forward them to the South Huntington Library. Most of the flags we collect are taken to Covanta Huntington for a respectful disposition by burning.

Charlie regularly conducts flag education classes for the youngest of our citizens: the boys and girls of our local scout troops.

# **Operation Enduring Care**



Operation Enduring Care came about 9 years ago as Al Statton, retired from 20 years active duty in the U.S. Army and a volunteer with the Greenlawn Fire Department, was being treated for successive cancers at the Northport VA.

He learned that the veterans homeless shelter,

then operated by the Salvation Army, needed donations of non-perishable meals, packaged underwear, socks and personal hygiene items. Al decided to focus his positive energy on helping others, while dealing with the clinical depression and pain of successive cancer diagnoses. Trips to drop off items at the shelter, put a positive touch on appointments for follow-ups on surgery, radiation and chemotherapy.

Operation Enduring Care has collected over 8,500 individual meals to date, with community support.

While the homeless shelter, once operated by the Salvation Army, and more recently, by United Veterans Beacon House, remains closed, Operation Enduring Cares continues its work at the Northport VA.

Residents in the Community Living Centers (CLC's), at the Northport VA, care for the elderly, infirm, very ill and terminally ill veterans of all war eras since WWII. Many of the older veterans have outlived spouses and family members. Many are seriously ill due to service to our country and may be terminally ill with cancers related to exposure to "Agent Orange" or other carcinogens.

Unlike civilian hospitals, the VA Medical Center does not supply personal health care items. Veterans unable to purchase these items due to failing health or terminal illness must go without unless these items are donated. Shampoo, tooth brushes, shaving cream and deodorant are not supplied to the patients by the VA. It is up to the families, or groups like, us to provide for these basic needs.

For the past four years, Greenlawn Post 1244 has joined with Operation Enduring Care to help raise awareness, raise funds and collect items to meet the needs of our most vulnerable veterans.

On Christmas Day this year, Al and Connie Statton assisted other volunteers in providing a Christmas Dinner to over 100 deserving veterans and family members at the Northport VA. Operation Enduring Care prepared special gift bags for both men and women, containing underwear,

socks, personal hygiene items and fleece blankets and throws. Some toys were also provided for the children in these families.

Most of these items were purchased with funds donated by community members and organizations.

We did a Veterans Day crossword puzzle, had a lively interchange with the kids, and ended by distributing American Flag stickers to each of the students. The students gave us cards that they made especially for their hon-

# Construction of Conte Center to Begin This Spring

#### A New Home for Greenlawn Post 1244

Huntington Town Supervisor Chad Lupinacci paid a visit to Post 1244 at our monthly meeting on October 9 to announce that the groundbreaking for the James D. Conte Community Center will take place in March 2020. Completion is planned for the spring of 2021.

The building, formerly the Huntington Station Armory of the New York National Guard, will have 393 sq. ft of

dedicated office space for our post as well as access to meeting rooms for our meetings and other events.

#### History

The State of New York transferred the 3.6 acre site and building to the Town in April, 2013. The former armory is named for Assemblyman James Conte, who was instrumental in securing the

transfer of the decommissioned building, which was used by the New York National Guard from 1960 until it closed in 2011.

Conte represented Huntington Station for 24 years. Lupinacci, who worked in Conte's Assembly office as a college student, and considered him a mentor, was elected to his seat upon his death.

In May 2012, upon learning of the Town's plan to take over the Armory, as commander, I wrote to Supervisor Frank Petrone requesting a meeting to discuss the building and to request space for our post as part of the community center. At that first meeting in June 2012, Petrone showed great interest in our proposal. The following months found us receiving the endorsement of the Huntington Veterans Advisory Board and letters of support from State, County and Town elected officials.

In March 2013, we submitted a detailed, needs-based proposal to the Town Board, showing how and why our Post should have this space and how this would serve the needs of Huntington's 11,000 veterans and their families. Many more meetings and discussions would take place over the next six years.

#### Our Past and Our Vision For the Future

In 2005, Post 1244 entered a phase of revitalization with the entry of a new leadership team. Meeting monthly at St. Joseph Council, Knights of Columbus, we concentrated on being a dedicated veteran service organization, very much involved in community affairs and recruiting veterans of all ages and war eras. Starting with just 83 paid members, and only about 7 active members, we have grown to over 220 veteran members, with a typical meeting attendance of 40-50.

We have been fortunate in attracting many talented

veterans who are willing to apply their talents to building the post and its programs into what they are today.

In time, we found that

we were hampered by not having a physical presence in the community. Many veteran's posts fail to be available to veterans who need advice and information. Limited hours of operation and "Members

Only" signs do nothing to welcome potential members and veterans who need our assistance. We plan to provide access to information and assistance for these veterans, as well as being a welcoming presence in the community.

Gulf War and Post 911 veterans, may have different expectations than previous generations of what a veteran service organization should provide. They are the first allvolunteer generation of veterans. Many are looking for an organization with a more family and community-oriented focus.

These veterans are our future. If our post is to survive after us, we have to find ways to serve them and their families in ways that match their needs and interests.

We can and should be a natural fit for them.

We now have an opportunity to build a new future for our post upon the foundations of our past. Rather than threatening our existing programs, this move will only serve to enhance them.

We welcome our member's input over the coming year to help us shape that future.


